

Power of Words

It's already August. Let that sink in! But truly what does that mean for Lions?

With a month into the new Lion year down, clubs should have their officers put into LCIs system. This step is important. Not only is it the turn of a new leaf, a fresh start for the Lion year but it also means secretaries should be checking member's information. A treasurer will not get invoices and a secretary will not get the newsletter if emails and addresses are wrong. 
This type of quick activity is great for an ice breaker to a meeting to have with your club. The following discussion will help members engage in dialing down to their own reasons for joining along with expectations of the club that are being met and those that are not. This year's goals can then be shifted to try an include those expectations to be met. Maybe it's a new member who thought being a part of the club should include a park clean up. What does that sound like? An opportunity for you as a leader to encourage that member to chair the environment project, empower them to do the research and find how the club can adopt a space in the community. Maybe a long-time member realizes their favorite project is the pancake supper but now has an idea on how to make his pancake flipping hours more efficient and easier.

One of the minor results of this type of discussion or exercise is that you're able to rediscover all the passions of the members in your club. You might've known a member for years but never realized one of their passions was decorating, a skill your club can use at the end of the year scholarship dinner. But all those words you come up with that relate to fellow members can be combined together to create a word cloud used to market what your club does for their community.

Even the words of unmet expectations can be flipped from a negative to an opportunity. It created an opportunity for members to foster a new idea and run with it. This creates new memories for members to work together as a team to accomplish a goal that will help their community. A new service project may also attract other community businesses and members to what Lions mean to their town.

So just like the Bass Pro Shop commercial says, Don't wait for adventure, seek it out for yourself. Use words as a tool to encourage discussion among members of what the club can do this year to keep up visibility, projects and of course the bottom line of service to others to help our neighbors.

Below is a list of the deadlines. The rules are listed on the next page but be sure to read the rules inside your kit when you receive the kit for any new information that may be included.

Peace Poster Contest Deadlines

Students ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15 are eligible to participate in the International Peace Poster Contest. Entries not meeting the following deadlines will be disqualified.

- **January 15:** Kits go on sale from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- October 1: Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- **November 15:** Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the Peace Poster Chair, B.C. Seely or sooner. I will have the district governor sign it and send to the State Chair.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **February 1:** International winners notified on or before this date.

Important things to know about the Peace Poster Contest

- 1. The theme for 2022-23 is "Lead with Compassion."
- Size matters! Posters can be no smaller than 13" X 20" and no larger than 20" X 24". No exceptions.
- 3. No words or numbers may be shown of any kind-not even a signature.
- 4. Standard peace symbols may be used-those pictured below are allowed.
- There must be an official Peace Poster sticker attached to the BACK RIGHT-HAND CORNER of the poster-NOT in the center, middle or top. Do NOT use a photocopy of the sticker-only the original sticker from the Peace Poster kit.
- 6. The poster cannot be 3D, or have anything glued or stamped to it. It also cannot be mounted on anything, and must be able to be rolled up and mailed in a Postal Service-approved mailing tube,




TEMPLE-BELTON LADIES




