

Lessons from an Eagle and Lion

There are two greats who stand out in the animal kingdom, the Lion and the Eagle. Between these two we can learn many traits that leaders around the world have displayed, but also many traits that as the change agents of our communities, hence leaders, we as Lions have deep within us to give.

**Lessons of a Lion

Lions are not the largest of the hunter animals, yet they are considered the kings of the jungle. This is due to their *attitude*. Attitude as a leader may be the top trait to consider. It is what others will learn about you first, therefore leaving the lasting impression of character. A leader is one who's attitude expresses a mix of both business for pushing people towards the common goal, as well as cheering through empowerment so that those who are in the team feel supported to keep stepping along the journey.

Courage and Strength of a lion go without saying. As a leader these two traits are still about being the elite hunter of pray a lion in the jungle is, but transferred to being a hunter of resources, people with skills to the right position and making the path clear enough for the team. It takes courage to bring change that might be needed and strength to stay the course all while encouraging even when you yourself do not feel encouraged.

They have focus and a boldness to strive for the goal. In a hunters case it is toward pray, but for us as leaders in our community, the focus has been service towards others with a boldness of making sure that service is sustainable towards keeping those being helped on the path towards a better tomorrow.

Lastly, Lions have an entire pride behind them for support. Each member has a role to play in the survival of all, knowing that without each other their might now be a tomorrow. They do not go at the journey alone. We have our fellow club members, our District and beyond to be able to lean on for support, encouragement and education of resources. Just as we offer hope to those in our communities we help through a lending hand, we too have people to reach out to for help.

**Lessons from an Eagle

The national bird of the United States, Eagles are majestic, intimidating but have soft qualities symbolizing freedom in the deepest sense of the word while being nurturing. They fly alone at high altitudes, but it is due to their superior vision that they can do this. These traits combined can be interpreted to mean that we should not so much walk alone but rather have the vision to seek those who encourage, support and provide positive growth opportunities rather than drag us down.

Eagles do not scavenge. They survive by eating fresh kills that they make. This is a life lesson for although while looking at what is around you and knowing that they might have been a great kill at a location, we must move forward to achieve the goal again fresh each time. You can acknowledge the past, but cannot depend on it for future success.

This also describes an Eagle when they go through a transformation. As one of the longest living species, up to 70 years, Eagles reach a point where feathers are heavy, their beak is deformed, and their talons do not sharpen. They do not give up on life then though or continue to struggle. They will seek a mountain top and remove each piece to regrow fresh and as strong as ever. This means their heart and soul are still the same and search out the same goals, but their tools have regrown to be stronger and better.

Such fierce creatures, yet Eagles are also known to nurture their young. They do this by providing not only resources for the young such as food and shelter, but also by challenging them. A mother eagle will teach their eaglet to fly by gathering it to her back and soaring into the air herself. This allows the baby to see reality. But at a point she will drop altitude allowing the eaglet to fall, learning their wings will catch them on the wind, yet still being their to catch them.

We as Lions will run through the desert of need to help our pride which is our community. Or we will fly at high altitudes to seek out opportunities where our vision to help can make the best impact.

In order to accomplish this requirement, we need your help. We ask that each club contact their assigned Director and set a date that you would like to have your annual briefing. Attached, is a listing of assigned Directors. If there is a change in your meeting day, frequency, or meeting time, please notify Dick Chapin (254.319.8034).

We Directors just visited the Camp and viewed the ongoing construction. The two new bunkhouses are in various stages of completion and 13 new cabins are being built on Eagle Trail. We will try to show you this construction during this year's update briefing.

Family camps are currently being conducted for 2022 and we are planning that regular camps may start again next year.

Because we Lions help fund the Camp operation, we encourage each club to pay its Lions Camp dues and 100% dues. Additionally, there are many other ways to help financially, and we will cover those in detail during our update briefings. In the near future, both clubs and individuals can support the 29th Annual Harry Wickersham Fund Raising Golf Tournament, by being a hole sponsor for just \$100. - October 1: Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- **November 15:** Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 15:** Postmark deadline for the multiple district council chairperson to send one winning poster to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **February 1:** International winners notified on or before this date.


